Looking Back at 2025 and Leaning into Hope: An Advent Reflection

As we step into Advent 2025, the familiar themes of waiting, longing, and hope feel especially poignant. The Advent wreath glows again in our sanctuary, each candle a quiet declaration that even the smallest light pushes back darkness. Before we let those lights guide our December days, it's worth pausing to remember the year we've travelled through - its challenges, its graces, and the ways God has been quietly at work among us in St Leonards-in-the-Fields.

May I say a personal thank you to the office bearers for their faithfulness and for the plans that will start in December when they will be involved with our friends at Perth North Church to have discussions regarding the Presbytery Mission Plan regarding a union with Perth North Church sometime in 2026. Do continue to support them all in your prayers.

A Year of Shifting Ground

For many, 2025 was a year of change. Some of us welcomed new life; others said painful goodbyes. We navigated global uncertainties, economic pressures, and the fast pace of a world that seems to shift beneath our feet. Our church family felt this too—new ministries launched, others concluded, and still others were reshaped in unexpected ways.

And yet, woven through every transition were small signs of God's faithfulness:

The volunteers who always arrive early to make coffee and stayed late to stack chairs.

The prayer chain and pastoral support to the congregation that carried requests with tenderness and persistence.

The quiet generosity that showed up exactly when it was needed.

These moments, ordinary though they may seem, speak of a God who never stops planting seeds of renewal.

Hope Found in our Shared Life

If 2025 taught us anything, it is that hope is not something we manufacture—it is something we receive. It comes through community, through worship, through Scripture, and through experiencing God's presence in both triumph and trial.

We witnessed hope small but significant ways, in the support we extended to those facing hardship, and in the laughter that filled our halls during coffee after service and with shared meals. We saw it in answered prayers and even in unanswered ones that pushed us deeper into trust.

Advent reminds us that hope is not a vague optimism. It has a name.

Hope is Jesus - God with us, God for us, God coming to make all things new.

Waiting With Expectation

As we light the candles of Advent - Hope, Peace, Joy, and Love - we acknowledge that waiting is part of the Christian journey. But ours is not passive waiting. It is active, attentive, expectant. We wait with the assurance that the God who was faithful in 2025 will be faithful in 2026 and beyond.

So, this Advent, may we slow down long enough to notice the light.

May we reflect on where God has met us this year, and where He might be calling us next.

May we carry gratitude for the story behind us and courage for the story ahead.

A Prayer for Advent 2025

Lord Jesus, you are the Light that darkness cannot overcome. As we enter this holy season of Advent, open our eyes to the hope already rising among us. Heal what has been wounded in this past year, strengthen what has been weary, and awaken us to Your coming - both in the quiet corners of our days and in the fullness of Your glory. Teach us to wait with joy and to walk forward with faith. Amen.

May this Advent be a season of renewed hope for you and your loved ones.

God has brought us this far - and He will carry us forward.

St Leonard's in the Fields Remembrance Day Service

Rev Eddie McKenna led about forty people in the Remembrance Service on 9th November. Dotted amongst the congregation were several acrylic transparent silhouette figures representing those who fell in war. There were poppy displays on either side of the communion table, on top of which was another arrangement of poppies. Poppy red fabric cascaded from the pulpit, lectern, and the side steps. The service began with a prayer for Rev Philip Majcher, and for Linda and their family.

We sang 'For all the Saints' and 'I Vow to Thee my Country' before the Act of Remembrance. Rev McKenna walked into the body of the kirk, and read aloud the names of the people who are remembered on the kirk's two war memorials. Alex Stewart, Sandy Cameron, Beryl Smeaton - and her grandson - laid wreaths at the two war memorials by the south door. The Two Minute Silence was observed with just the clicking of heating audible as we stood to attention.

*When you go home, tell them of us and say,
For your tomorrow, we gave our today.*

David Wright played the Pipers' Lament. The sound of the bagpipes faded into the distance and the congregation resumed their seats. Alasdair Graham read the lessons from Psalm 17 and 2 Thessalonians 2:13.

Rev McKenna's sermon touched on 'poppy politics' - the outcry over newsreaders wearing/not wearing poppies, the adoption of symbols of Remembrance by far-right organisations, and the usurping of the poppy for political gain. Rev McKenna reminded us of the millions of overseas nationals who fought in both wars - 20% of Battle of Britain pilots were not British. The act of Remembrance, said, Rev McKenna, is a bridge between generations. The poppy is a symbol of quiet Remembrance. After prayers, we sang 'Lord for the Years' and concluded the service with The National Anthem.

Church of Scotland Stamp Project 2025-2026

This year, by donating our used stamps, we are supporting the Al Ahli Arab Hospital in Gaza. The Hospital, in Northern Gaza, has been in operation since 1882.

The hospital is owned and run today by the Anglican Diocese of Jerusalem, a partner Church of the Church of Scotland, and is the only Christian hospital in the Gaza Strip and Gaza's only cancer hospital.



It normally handles around 300 surgeries and 600 radiological and a total of 3,000 outpatient visits per month. It is supported by international charities such as Embrace the Middle East. In times of calm during the occupation of Gaza, Al Ahli Hospital runs as any normal hospital with varying departments and an Accident and Emergency dealing with the usual day to day ailments of a population.

Since the beginning of the conflict in Gaza in October 2023, the Al Ahli Anglican Hospital has conducted emergency operations 24 hours per day, operating on 30-35 people per day. For further details, please visit the Church of Scotland website at <https://shorturl.at/ISEoF>

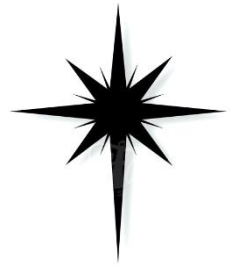

A Christmas Carol and Our Times

Every December, Charles Dickens' *A Christmas Carol* returns to our screens (whether it's the film starring Alastair Sim or Kermit the Frog), a story so familiar it risks becoming mere sentiment. Yet beneath the ghostly visitations and redemptive tears lies something deeply challenging - a mirror held up not just to Scrooge's heart, but to our own.

Dickens wrote in an age of profound inequality, and Scrooge's dismissal of the poor rings disturbingly familiar in our own time. "*If they would rather die, they had better do it, and decrease the surplus population,*" he declares. We might not use such blunt language, but how often do we encounter similar sentiments wrapped in different words? In debates about homelessness, immigration, or those struggling with the cost of living, we hear echoes of Scrooge's cold certainty that poverty is simply the natural order - and not our concern.



What makes Dickens' story revolutionary, though, is that it refuses to accept this as inevitable.

When the Ghost of Christmas Present takes Scrooge to Bob Cratchit's modest home he sees their humanity. They are not statistics or problems to be solved. They are people celebrating, struggling, hoping, loving. And in that seeing, something shifts in Scrooge. He begins to understand that the poor are not separate from us; they are us, our neighbours, our responsibility.

This is the heart of what Christmas calls us to as a church community. It's not enough to feel moved by Tiny Tim's plight or to cheer Scrooge's eventual generosity. The real question is: who are we ignoring? Where in our own communities have we grown accustomed to suffering we could address? What conversations are we avoiding because they're uncomfortable?

Yet there's hope in Dickens' vision. Scrooge's transformation isn't merely emotional - it leads to action. He raises Bob Cratchit's wages. He becomes a second father to Tiny Tim. He becomes "*as good a friend, as good a master, and as good a man, as the good old city knew.*" His change of heart changes his community.

This too speaks to us. Faith without works is dead, as the Apostle James reminds us in James 2:17, and James 2:26. Our churches are filled with people of good intentions, but what matters is what we do - how we support those facing hardship, how we advocate for justice, how we ensure that the vulnerable know they are seen and valued.

As we approach Christmas, perhaps we might ask ourselves Dickens' unspoken question: Will we be like Scrooge before his visitation, or after? Will we hear the cries of need in our own town and turn away? Or will we, like the transformed Scrooge, recognise our common humanity and act?

We can hope that the spirits don't visit us on Christmas Eve, but the challenge remains. The question of how we treat the least among us is as urgent now as it was in Dickens' time—and our answer matters more than we know.

Dundee Courier – Friday 09 December 1898

Free St Leonard's Choir.

A recital of sacred music the choir of Free St Leonard's Church was given in the hall of the church last night—Mr J. Howard Douglas conducting. The programme embraced several pieces which have become classical, like Barnby's requiem, "Sleep thy last sleep." The choir made an excellent appearance under Mr Douglas's guidance in their several efforts. The soloists were Misses Christie and M. Brand and Mr J. Thomson. Sir Robert Pullar presided, and remarks were made by Rev. Dr Bannerman.

Perthshire Advertiser – Wednesday 11 December 1935

St Leonard's in the Fields congregation held a successful sale of work in the Church Hall in aid of foreign and home missions. A sum of

nearly £119* was raised, including gift service contributions of £26 10s. The Rev. Andrew Cumming presided at the opening ceremony, which was performed by Mrs Buist, wife of the former Lord Provost of Dundee. Mrs Buist described the widespread organisation of the Church of Scotland as one of the most marvellous things to be found in any country, and declared that when the church lost her interest in foreign missions, she would lose herself. Mrs Cumming proposed a rote of thanks to Mrs Buist and a similar compliment was paid to the ladies of the Work Party and other assistants on the call of Mr Charles Barclay. A feature of the decorations was the series of emblem. arranged at the various stalls, and executed by Mr John Halley. Miss Ballantine, secretary of the Ladies' Work Party, discharged the secretarial duties.

City Church Players in Religious Drama - St Leonard's in the Fields Entertainment



The first of three performances of "A Man's House," a religious drama in three acts by John Drinkwater, was given last night by the Literary and Dramatic Society of Leonard's-in-the-Fields Church, Perth. The Rev. Andrew Cumming presided over a large audience in the Church Hall. Formed only a short time ago, the Society is to be congratulated on the success of its first expedition into the realms of the theatre. The members set themselves a difficult problem in their initial venture, for Drinkwater's play of Jerusalem in 30 A.D. demands vivid and dramatic representation. If the performances to-night and to-morrow
